The Colors of Advent

Churches often display the color purple (or blue) during Advent. In ancient times, purple was expensive and used almost exclusively by kings, other royalty and persons of wealth. Purple reminds us of Christ, who is our King, worthy of our obedience, loyalty and love. It also speaks of our need for penitence as we prepare to celebrate Christmas again.



The Symbolism of the Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is a symbol of watchfulness as the birth of Jesus approaches. The circular form of the wreath symbolizes eternity, or life without end. The candles remind us that Jesus is the Light of the World who brought light and life to a dark world (see John 1:4-5). We light a new candle on each of the four Sundays, then on Christmas Eve we light the white Christ candle. As the light grows, so does our anticipation and joy!

5K Summary Report for 2018

Community Supports the 12th Annual Falling Leaves 5K Charity Run Over \$7,500 to be donated to Veterans & Community Housing Coalition

The Ballston Spa UMC would like to thank its 33 sponsors and those local businesses that provided a total of 41 gift certificates worth about \$1,550 as door prizes for the nearly 200 race participants. Because of their generosity, the 5K Committee estimates that we will be able to donate in excess of \$7,500 to the Veterans & Community Housing Coalition (VCHC) to be earmarked for the two residences in Ballston that provide housing and services for homeless male and female Veterans. Craft Night - Get Creative!



Celebrating the Work of Our Trustees

There has been much activity in our church buildings and on our grounds as the year ends. In the church house some much needed rails have been placed on the front and back set of stairs. In front of the church and in our parking lot much time and care has been taken in cleaning up fall leaves. Our outside lights are now set to come on as darkness falls. This is another small but important task that trustees take care of each fall, along with furnace inspections and upkeep. A large lift has been in use replacing tiles and doing routine roof work. One of the most visible changes is the new, updated, handicapped accessible bathroom in the front of the church.





A Blast from the Past.....

Here is part two of the story of the construction of our church building. The new cornerstone was laid on October 19, 1892 and work was progressing on schedule for the new church. Then tragedy struck on January 4, 1893 when Nelson R. Vandenburgh, the carpentry contractor, fell from the scaffold in the church and died three days later. He was sixty years old, survived by his wife, two sons, three daughters, one step-son, three brothers and three sisters. He was an honorary member of the Eagle Hose Co. #1, a member of the Franklin Lodge No. 90 and served as a Village Trustee in 1871 and 1884 - 1886.

Mr. Vandenburgh's bondsmen refused to go on with the contract and demanded a settlement from the Building Committee. The Committee was not able to re-let the contract for a reasonable price. The church stood there in mid-winter without a roof, exposed to the elements. Finally, the Building Committee made a decision to carry on with the work only during daylight hours. Workers were hired and work was pushed ahead as quickly as possible. Eventually a contract was made with R.C. Vandenburgh for materials and DeRoy DeGarmo for the carpentry work at a cost of \$5300. This was a very difficult time for our church as the congregation was deeply anguished over the tragic accident, and there was a lot of time and money lost bringing the church to completion.

The Dedication Service for the new building was on December 17, 1893 which included both a morning and evening service. Bishop John P. Newman preached at the morning service and former pastor Rev. John H. Coleman preached at the evening service. The December 19, 1893 article in *The Saratogian* described the new church. The building was built of red brick with grey stone and terra cotta trimmings. The roof has numerous gables and in front are two small towers and on the north is a steeple over 100 feet high. There are two entrances and main auditorium that is 80 feet by 70 feet and can seat about six hundred people.

The designer of the interior was W.H. Ayers of Gloversville. The walls are painted a soft salmon color with reliefs in light blue and darker shades of salmon. All the windows are stained glass and are memorials to various people with the exception of two windows. (Histories of the window dedications will be in another issue.) The organ stands directly behind the pulpit. It was built and installed by J.W. Steere and Sons of Springfield, MA for \$1600. It had a water motor with 23 stops and nearly 1000 pipes.

The upstairs Sunday School area has six spacious classrooms and decorations and woodwork that correspond to the auditorium. The basement will be used as a kitchen and dining room, with church parlors where all the social events will be held. The building is lighted by electricity and heated by hot air. The ceiling is finished in spruce. The woodwork finish is red oak.

The bell was purchased from the Meneely and Co. in West Troy. The bell was installed in September 1893 and weighs 3069 pounds and is made of genuine cast bronze. The inscription reads as follows:

THE FIRST METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH BALLSTON SPA, NEW YORK 1893 "LOVE ONE ANOTHER" GLORY TO GOD IN THE HIGHEST AND ON EARTH PEACE, GOOD WILL TOWARD MEN. COMMITTEE: M.J. ESMOND J.C. RUSSUM
