Greetings Church family,

This front page in our newsletter is a space where pastors have often shared their thoughts about God, the church, its ministries - and how we might share such things with the world outside our doors. It is a message from the pastor's heart, seeking to guide, bless or encourage their congregation. This month I want to offer us all some reminders and guidelines about communication. Some might call these "common sense", but I think that in these days of never-ending tensions (in society, government, workplaces, and our beloved United Methodist Church) it is good to be reminded of the basics. This wisdom comes right out of the Bible!

The key to great communication starts in the HEART. It is the "control room" of our mind so God reminds us to "guard it well" (Provers 4:23). Whenever we want to share our perspective, our "truth", we are to do so in a loving way. Here are some specific ways we can communicate most effectively as Christians:

Don't be quick to speak. James 1:19 says "Let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to anger." We all have times when emotions or negative thoughts get bottled up in us, and we can be tempted to speak recklessly. That unfiltered "venting" may feel temporarily satisfying but speaking rashly often has lasting consequences. Theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer spoke of the need to practice "the ministry of holding one's tongue". Are there people in your life with whom you need to "hold your tongue"? God can help you have more self-control and thoughtfulness when you feel the need to express yourself. If this is a need you feel, then take this to the Lord in prayer and God will help you.

Don't focus on just "your own opinion". Proverbs 18:2 says "A fool finds no pleasure in understanding but delights in airing his own opinions." Communication is about sharing and exchanging ideas and opinions. Focusing solely on your opinion is one-sided and it can even be narrow-minded. One of the best ways we can invite others to freely express their thoughts is to say "Help me understand what you mean...". If you are genuinely humble and can keep yourself in a place of "curiosity", that helps communication feel safe for others. This is definitely a "do unto others as you would like them to do unto you" reminder from God!

Don't be argumentative. Proverbs 25:24 says "It is better to live in the corner of the housetop, than inside a house shared with an argumentative wife." Let's not be "one of those people" - the stereotypical, cantankerous individual nobody wants to be around. Find a time and place when you are rested and feeling able to have a productive discussion. Set a reasonable time limit for

your dialogue. Be respectful in the words you choose to use - and in their quantity! Also be mindful of your tone of voice. Did you know that the root word in sarcasm means "to cut flesh"? Ouch - who would want to cut someone and make them bleed? That is a cautionary image and reminder, isn't it? When we

communicate, our goal is to be heard but it must also be to listen and understand the other person. That full circle is needed. We can and will disagree with others, but with God's help we can be our best, loving, respectful self in the process.

"Now that you know these things you will be blessed if you put them into practice!" John 13:17

Through **engagement**, we send out grace-filled followers of Christ who are putting their faith into action, helping to transform the surrounding community, and offering hospitality in the name of Jesus Christ. Thus, H.O.P.E. cycles back around.

It All Depends on Your Attitude

In Africa it is said that there is a certain fruit called the "taste berry." This berry supposedly can affect one's taste for several hours. Not only is the berry itself sweet, it makes other things seem sweeter when eaten. What a wonderful fruit this must be if it really exists and works that well.

In human personality there is a "taste berry," and it is one's attitude. If one's attitude is good, good can be found in the worst of tragedies. The worst of defeats can spur one on to do better the next time and to take advantage of lessons learned.

With the right attitude one can see good in others in spite of their faults. A flawed effort on the part of someone whose heart is not totally pure can be viewed, not as a worthless attempt by a scoundrel, but as a step in the right direction.

On the other hand, if our attitude is not right, we can find fault with the best of efforts by the sincerest of people. Even the brightest of days will be overcast with a shadow of negative judgments. Have you ever been around someone who has the wrong attitude toward the Lord's church? All they can point to are the flaws and the faults (and there are plenty of them and they are easy to spot). All they seem to do is criticize and judge. If you try to get these people to see the good side of the picture, my experience has been that many of them refuse to listen. They do not want their negative prejudice to be dismissed by the truth. They do not want to know about all the benevolent work, mission work, and other good deeds done by God's people out of the goodness of their hearts.

It would be nice if we had a spiritual taste berry which we could give to people which would instantaneously make them positive, tenderhearted, grateful encouragers. All I know to do is to recommend a strong dose of prayer, Bible reading and "thinking about such things" as whatever is true, noble, right, pure, lovely and admirable (Col. 4:8).

Ash Wednesday

On February 26th at 7 pm you are invited to an Ash Wednesday service in the sanctuary. Ash Wednesday is a Christian holy day of prayer and fasting. It marks the first day of Lent, the six weeks of penitence before Easter. Ash Wednesday is traditionally observed by Western Christians. Most Latin Rite Roman Catholics observe it, as do some Protestants including Anglicans, Lutherans, Methodists, Nazarenes and Independent Catholics.

During Ash Wednesday mass or services, a minister distributes ashes by lightly rubbing the shape of a cross with ashes onto the foreheads of worshipers. The tradition of tracing a cross on the forehead is meant to identify the faithful with Jesus Christ.

Ashes are a symbol of death in the Bible. God formed humans out of dust:

"The Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground. He breathed the breath of life into the man's nostrils, and he became a living person. (Genesis 2:7).


