I gained an appreciation for hard, physical labor - sometimes it takes muscles and sweat to get a job done. I learned how valuable it is to help a neighbor down the road with their work, especially during haying season or when someone got sick for a spell. They would come just as quickly to your place to help you when things got tough. I learned the difference between worrying and a real crisis. Most things in life can be patched, just like our farm fences. But not too often should we ever think about giving up. Farmers know that bumper crops do happen, but much more often a person needs to take the yield God gives them and be grateful. And out in the countryside, a bad day can get better with a drive in your pickup truck, cruising country roads, the windows down but the country music turned up.

Going to the fair always grounds me. I wander through the many barns, with multiple generations of farmers, displaying their finest animals. The freshest, finest produce is judged and given ribbons. Tractors old and new draw much attention, along with music, entertainment and carnival rides. And fair food, well, who doesn't love that?

I hope you are savoring your summer experiences as well. May you find yourself feeling grateful to God and renewed in your spirit.

We ask church members and friends to help in making the 13<sup>th</sup> Annual Run a success again this year by either participating in the Run or volunteering to work on October 12<sup>th</sup>. Beginning on either Sunday, September 15<sup>th</sup> or 22<sup>nd</sup>, we will have sign-up sheets available for members and friends to

volunteer for the October 12<sup>th</sup> Falling Leaves 5K. Traffic Safety, food preparation and distribution, race registrations, t-shirt distribution and making baked goods are just some of the areas that you can help with.

Please promote our run to your friends and relatives as a community and family event on a scenic course through the beautiful Village of Ballston Spa with many gift certificates given out after the run. Last year local businesses donated over \$1,500 in gift certificates for the participants. Our charity of choice again this year is the Veterans and Community Housing Coalition, with the funds earmarked for the two houses for homeless veterans in Ballston Spa. Over the past three years we have been able to give back over \$22,000 to this charity. Registration by October 9<sup>th</sup> is \$25, and day of race is \$30. The Run begins and ends at Kelley Park near the Village Pool. By drinking or eating Fair Trade products, you are working in mission ministry! How easy is that?!

As a United Methodist Church, we are required to keep records of births, deaths, marriages, baptisms, confirmations, positions held in the church, church transfers, and a myriad of other information. At this point everything important is in paper files. This software will allow us the ability to quickly locate and navigate all of this information in minutes, instead of hours or days. This information needs to be correct. So, and here is the hard part, we are asking that you complete a form giving us this information (and yes, the year of your birth is important!) so it may be put into the system correctly, the first time. After the program has been populated you will receive a print-out of what we have so you may check our information. This form can be located in the church, before or after the service, and when completed it may be either placed in the collection plate, placed in the Office Manager's mailbox in the Connections Café, or returned directly to the church office. #### The Visitor

This summer I visited ten churches (as of this writing). I did this in order to see what other UMC churches are doing and how they do it. Things I learned:

Some had small, medium and large congregations.

The churches with smaller congregations were friendlier than those with larger congregations.

Some churches do not have a "front" door and you need to enter through a "side" door, depending on how the church was built. It would be nice to have some signage to that effect instead of having to ask people in the parking lot how to enter the church. If no one was outside I just kept trying each door I came to until I found an open one.

Some churches had more than 25 people for a summer Sunday. Good attendance!

Some people don't talk to you unless you ask them a question. (Mostly in medium to larger congregations.)

Some churches do not have any visual aids (projection power point slides).

Some churches depend on power point slides more than what is in their bulletin.

Having slides projected doesn't always help. At one church the pastor announced that we should all know the song "He Has the Whole World in His Hands" and we would be singing all verses. The person running the projector kept flipping around to try and find the verse that the congregation was singing (different areas of the congregation were signing different verses all at the same time). The choir didn't lead or say what order the verses would be in. **Thanks to our music director who thinks of these small but important elements!** 

Some churches have cushions on/in the pews and others do not.

Some churches have hand fans to help combat the heat and others do not.

One church had a children's bulletin. Some churches had a welcome packet, but I only remembered to pick up one.

One person didn't have an answer to my question and said, "That's a good question." This was in reference to seeing 9 handicap parking spaces and then being directed to stairs to get to the sanctuary. I wondered how the handicapped were able to get to the sanctuary. The couple in front of me said there was an elevator and asked if I'd like to see it. We rode the elevator down to where the coffee hour was taking place. Again, signage would have eliminated my confusion.

In the church I visited on Communion Sunday, it was explained how communion would be served. Always a plus. However, this same church has the ushers start from the back and work their way forward for sending people up for communion which was not explained.

The majority of churches did not explain anything. Visitors were expected to be able to follow the bulletin. Umm, bad idea. During the last verse of the last hymn at one church, everyone moved to the middle. I looked up and wondered what was going on. Made me feel a little awkward and separated.

At another church they were having cake for the pastor and his wife. "Newly married" was the reason. Of course, it would be nice if people did not hover around the table so that others could reach the table. At this particular church, after getting their piece of cake the congregants "clumped" into groups of two or three. No one spoke to me. I had asked the gentleman sitting next to me a question regarding a bulletin and he introduced me to a Trustee when I explained why I showed up half an hour late. I did arrive in time to hear the whole sermon so that was good. Apparently, they only show the change in time on their website and not through the umc.org website.

Bulletins come in all shapes and sizes. Yes, I have them all with any inserts that came with them.

Some churches have a different order than we do. Which is fine, but visitors should arrive early to skim the bulletin. One church took the offering after the first hymn!

The most important thing I learned is there is no place like my home church. I am blessed to be a part of this friendly church family.

I hope to continue visiting different churches next summer to increase my knowledge of various ways to worship. By seeing what other churches do differently we can improve the experience of anyone who attends our church.

#### REASONS TO CALL THE PASTOR AT CHURCH (518-885-6886)

- before you or someone in your family goes to the hospital
- when you would like to talk or pray about a difficult situation
- when you know of someone else who is in need of spiritual help
- when events of great joy come to you or your family
- when there is a death in the family
- when there is a prolonged reaction to grief
- when you have questions about worship, Sunday School, your financial gifts or other areas of church life
- when you want to volunteer your time and talents, but do not know where or how to start
- after you have seen the pastor at worship. She can't possibly remember every suggestion or request given to her while shaking hands after worship, as much as she would like to, so please write her a note or call her for an appointment.

#### REASONS TO CALL THE PASTOR AT HOME

- you or a loved one is facing a serious and immediate crisis
- there is a pressing church concern that needs attention before morning
- you want to invite her or her family to your home for some socializing

In an effort to maintain a relatively normal home life, we ask that you confine routine calls to 9 am - 9 pm. In a pastoral emergency, please call anytime, day or night, to 518-309-3737.
