

Christmas can be a painful time. The constant, inescapable refrain about the happiness of the season reminds many people of what they have lost or have never had. Broken or lost relationships, employment and financial insecurity, poor health, depression – all of these can be more difficult as the nights lengthen and the cold intrudes. Recognizing that Christ came to comfort those who struggle with sadness and pain, First Presbyterian Church will host a community service of scripture, prayer, music and candle lighting to invite God's Word to shine light into our darkness. Everyone, regardless of church background (or no religious affiliation) is welcome.



Inspiration for Congregations to Promote Wellness

Poinsettias

Helping to decorate our sanctuary with a poinsettia is a beautiful offering to symbolize the Christmas Holiday. Some believe the poinsettia has a Christian significance. Although we now think of the poinsettia as a distinctive American symbol, one tale suggests that it was first brought to this country by Dr. Joel Poinsett from Mexico. It was in 1825 that Poinsett, then U.S. Minister to Mexico, became familiar with this beautiful crimson plant that covers the hillsides in Mexico.

After four years, he returned to his Charleston, S.C., home and brought with him some of the plants. The Mexicans call it the "flower of the holy night," and associate it with a story about a little girl who wept on her way to church on Christmas Eve because she had no gift to bring. As she knelt on the ground to pray, she saw this lovely plant and gladly took its red beauty into the church as her Christmas gift to the Christ child.

The church office will be accepting orders for Christmas poinsettias. All orders must be placed by Sunday, December 17th, with checks payable to the Briarwood Flower & Gift Shoppe.

Please feel free to remove your plant after the Christmas Eve Service to use in your home or share with someone special.
